

2021 EOCCO Community Health Plan (CHP) Gilliam County

PRIORITY ISSUE #1: Food Insecurity

PROBLEM IDENTIFIED:

Limited access to fresh fruits and vegetables Limited access to food Limited Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program recipients using their benefits at Farmer's

DATA AVAILABLE:

Markets

- Focus Group Access to healthy foods limited
- 60.7% of students are eligible for free or reduced lunch (State 47.6%)
- Estimated # of food insecure individuals 260
- Estimated % of food insecure individuals 18.9%
- Estimated % of EOCCO members with food insecurity 44.7%
- Estimated % of EOCCO members facing hunger 18.8%
- Estimated that of 184 EOCCO adult members only 45 eat 5 or more servings of fruits and vegetables per day
- Gilliam County Residents (BRFSS 2010-2013) 37.7% ate 5 or more servings of fruits and vegetables per day (State 20.3%)
- There are an average of 93 children enrolled in SNAP on a monthly basis
- There are an average of 265 total people enrolled in SNAP on a monthly basis

GOALS:

- 1 A- Continue the Frontier Veggie RX (FVRx) Program
- 1 B- Increase Referrals to the Gilliam County Food Pantry(s)
- 1 C- Establish the Double Up Food Bucks program

ACTION PLAN:

- 1A 1 Continue to dedicate LCAC funds to Frontier Veggie RX
- 1A 2 Participate on Frontier Veggie RX Advisory Council
- 1A 3- Serve as local liaison between Frontier Veggie RX Program and local Prescribers and Vendors
- 1B 1- Work with Community Action Program of East Central Oregon (CAPECO) to ensure Gilliam Food Pantry(s) are well stocked and inform all Frontier Veggie RX consumers of availability and accessibility of foods that are not fruits and vegetables
- 1C 1- Develop and create a plan to Fund the Double Up Food Bucks program at the Farmer's Market

ESTIMATED BUDGET NEEDED:

To fully fund the Frontier Veggie RX an additional 25% more funds are needed = \$6,570 If all 265 SNAP recipients were to use the Double Up Food Bucks Program at "5" Farmers Markets, \$13,250 would be needed (265x\$10) x 5 Farmer's Markets

PRIORITY ISSUE #2: Early Childhood

PROBLEM IDENTIFIED:

Obesity

Developmental Screens (0-36 month)

Trauma Informed Care Training

DATA AVAILABLE:

- Focus Group- Childhood Obesity
- Incentive Measure BMI and nutrition and physical activity counseling
- 2006-2009 Gilliam Adults 33% Obese (Oregon 26.9%)
- Incentive Measure Developmental Screens Gilliam 66.7% 2018 Met Measure
- 16% of 3-4 year olds enrolled in preschool
- 29% of minimum wage needed for childcare
- Median annual cost of childcare \$6,180
- In 2017 Gilliam Kindergarteners were better or equal to State average for Self-Regulation, Numbers & Operations, Small Letter Names and Sounds. Lower than the State in Interpersonal Skills and Total Approaches to Learning
- Adverse Childhood Experiences/Events lead to poor health later in life

GOALS:

- 2A- Increase data available to track Childhood Obesity
- 2B- Increase number of developmental screens and well-child metric reviewed by Primary Care Clinicians
- 2C- Assess organizational training of health and human service providers in Trauma Informed Care

ACTION PLAN:

- 2A 1- Work with Early Learning Center, WIC, and other early childhood programs (Head Start in Arlington) to share their BMI data every 6months
- 2A 2— Encourage School Systems to share collected data on school children heights and weights
- 2B 1— Review and update the communication process between Early Learning system screeners and primary care clinicians to ensure that timely services are being provided to children
- 2C 1- Assess which social service and education organizations have conducted Trauma Informed Care

PROBLEM IDENTIFIED:

Services in Gilliam County are limited

DATA AVAILABLE:

- Focus Group No Patient Centered Primary Care Homes in Gilliam
- Incentive Measure % of patients assign to a PCPCH Of 327 members in 2017 85 wereassigned to North Gilliam Health District and 133 to South Gilliam Health District
- Cost and Utilization Report 33% of EOCCO Plan Members consumed NO primary care in 2017
- Focus Group "some children do not have the spectrum of well child services in the county. They must go outside for services"

GOALS:

3A- Increase access to immunizations in North Gilliam through the Vaccines for Children program

ACTION PLAN:

3A 1- Work with the Arlington Clinic to implement VFC program

PRIORITY ISSUE #4: Oral Health

PROBLEM IDENTIFIED:

Lack of dental care access for Medicaid recipients

DATA AVAILABLE:

- Dental services limited
- Incentive Measure Dental Sealants 25.8% 2018 Met Measure

GOALS:

4A- Monitor Tele-Dentistry and school-based preventive dental programs in Arlington and school-based preventive dental program in Condon

ACTION PLAN:

- 4A 1- Serve as liaison between providers sites in Condon/Arlington and Advantage Dental from DentaQuest
- 4A 2- Promote the use of the Tele-Dentistry Services
- 4A 3- Monitor utilization to ensure residents are aware of the available services
- 4A 4- Increase consent form return rates for preventive dental service treatment offered at the middle and high schools in Arlington and Condon
