Community Connections

1. Welcome and Introductions – Alicia
  - a. Meeting started at 12:03 p.m.
2. Community Announcements
  - a. Tamyra K. wanted to give Mary Jo a positive shout out on a good job with the transportation efforts and about new Taxi service and has business cards for anyone that might need one.
  - b. Haley announced Tall Cop that will be in Baker August 17<sup>th</sup>. It is a training regarding drug and alcohol trends for 2018. The training is free and lunch is provided as long as you registered. Continuing education is available – for teachers, law enforcement, and clinicians.
  - c. Mary Jo shared about Mobile Access Care August 7<sup>th</sup> will be present at Community Connections 9a.m.-3p.m. Mary Jo said to call her office to set up appoints with MAC. The information that is needed was emailed out earlier from Brenda. Jessica shared that there is a sliding fee scale for the services and Mary Jo stated she does not believe anyone will be turned away due to inability to pay. THIS WILL BE EMAILED OUT AGAIN.
    - i. Michelle asked about the matching grant for transportation. Mary Jo stated that it is just getting started. Rides to Wellness has been of service to one person so far therefore it has started but it is a slow start. Working on developing the reporting for EOCCO as EOCCO is asking for more information on the reports that was not initially asked for. This is open to the general public but it is still screened due to minimum dollars. Primary audience is individuals who do not have OHP or veteran services for transportation to help fill the gap of those demographics and transportation needs.
  - d. Community Night Out August 7<sup>th</sup> at Geiser Pollman Park. Set-up starts at 3 food starts at 4.
3. Approve Past Minutes – June 5, 2018
  - a. Tamyra Keller motioned to approve the meetings Kathy Getty second the motion to approve June 5, 2018 minutes
4. Opioid Abuse Prevention – Mike Stensrud
  - a. Update:
    - i. Prescribing rate is down 10% in 4 county region
      1. Baker County 8.5% down
      2. Compared to last quarter it is up 1% but next quarter should show a drop again.
    - ii. Service Provider change in software (enrollments were dropped)

1. Mandatory enrollment deadline has passed – enrollment in the prescription monitoring software is not mandatory to be used after enrollment is complete
- iii. Opioid Training available is upcoming/scholarships available –agenda supplied
  1. Mike is willing to carpool if anyone wants to go down with him.
- iv. Reviewing the map coverage- the darker the color the higher the prescription rates and correlates with the overdose deaths occurring in those counties (data is supplied from CDC)
  1. Baker County is ranked 7<sup>th</sup> in the state of Oregon (moved from number 8). Union County is ranked 2<sup>nd</sup>.
  2. Discussed having prescription drop-offs and that Baker only has one once a year drop off for prescription meds where as other counties have a year around drop-off area. Mike is working on getting another one set-up again in Baker the police department is not willing to take it on again due to issues that occurred last time they hosted the drop off station.
  3. Mike is working on finding another law enforcement partner or pharmacy in Baker to get a new one.
  4. Tamyra asked about empty bottles with residue and what to do, Mike affirmed it was okay to just throw those away. Alicia recommended taking personal information off the bottles. Tara stated that veterinarians will take empty bottles as well.
  5. Maurizio asked for clarification on the overdose death count. Mike explained that toxicology reports help with getting the count and explained that prescription opioids are hard to follow the doctor ordered routine. Mike explained that education around overdose risks and risks of sharing opioids needs to be increased.
  6. Tamyra asked about the definition of opioid – Mike explained that it is all-encompassing natural opiates and synthetic opioids.
  7. Jennifer asked about separation of subaxone clinic numbers. Mike affirmed that these numbers are now separated but they used to not be.
  8. Mike offered to present a larger presentation to any group that desires it. Haley invited having him at Baker County Safe Communities Coalition and Alicia asked about having something for Adolescent Wellness as well.
5. Challenge Day Update – Haley
  - a. Haley shared that we need volunteers that pass background checks through the school. Mid-August is when confirmed dates are needed from volunteers and background checks complete. If you have a background check through the school already that is up to date, you would be good to go.
6. E2E – Member Engagement Subcommittee – Michael

- a. Michael shared information from the Engage to Empower minutes
  - i. We had 10 people at our luncheon as we joined with Behavioral Health and Wellness
  - ii. Tamyra shared transportation resources
  - iii. Group talked about a drop-in center (virtual drop-in center) – this idea was brought up at the last meeting and the group is exploring what this could look like.
  - iv. Next meeting is July 24<sup>th</sup> Tuesday at The Calvary Baptist. We meet for an hour and then eats lunch with the peer luncheon attendees and visit afterwards without professional support.
  - v. E2E Minutes are sent out monthly to all council members.
7. Updates on 2018 – LCAC funds – Jill/Nancy
  - a. Received the check on July 2<sup>nd</sup> and can start paying on projects.
8. Adolescent Wellness Event – Alicia
  - a. Going to take place July 31<sup>st</sup> August 1<sup>st</sup> and August 2<sup>nd</sup>.
  - b. A lot of providers have been in support of the event. Last year there was 70 volunteers and this year is approximately 80-90 volunteers.
  - c. Marketing -
    - i. partnering with GOBHI and MODA to send letters to 7-12<sup>th</sup> grade students/residents who are OHP members. Last year 660 people got letters. An advertisement is also placed at the Eltrym Theater. Haley offered to add advertisement at Movies in Central Park. Aubrey offered add it to the Power Point that plays prior to the movie.
  - d. This year dental is going to be added to the provider support.
  - e. Physical therapists are available as well
  - f. Nurse station will be available to talk about safety and parental involvement
  - g. Mental Health will be present as well to discuss services and preventative information and screenings.
  - h. Two tablets will be raffled off, and 4-5 SPARK digital water bottles.
    - i. Michelle added that SPARK was a program from OHSU regarding autism testing and was curious if it was the same. Shannon shared that this particular water bottles just lights up when you reach your daily intake.
  - i. Tamyra asked about a reading program that could partner with stuff for teenagers and movies in the park.
    - i. Alicia shared that the literacy coalition works on that and Haley added that Cradle 2 Career and the Summer Reading Program.
    - ii. Shari shared that the books at Total Health are available for clients to just read books but isn't meant to replace any libraries or isn't part of any set program.
  - j. Tamyra asked about funding for this project and Alicia shared that the Health Dept. applies for this grant every year when EOCCO opens it up and that it is separate from the LCAC.
